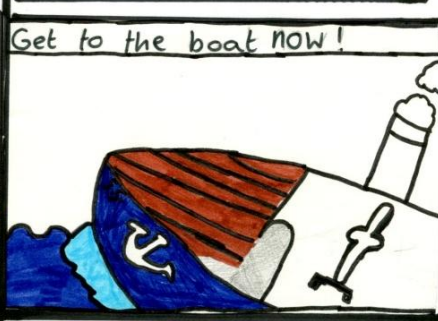

We are nearly there. I can see smoke for miles and the sound of guns an cannons going off is deafening. There's no way I am going to survive this.

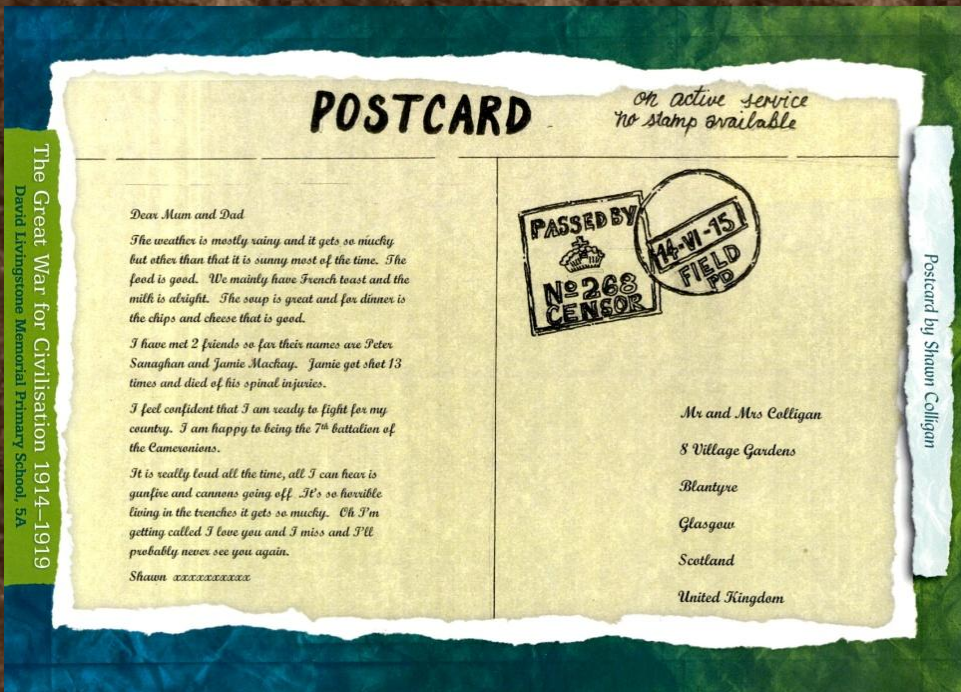

"CHARGE!!!" Our sergeant gives the command and we all run forward. I can see the enemy running towards us and realise that it's them or us. I start to fire my rifle.

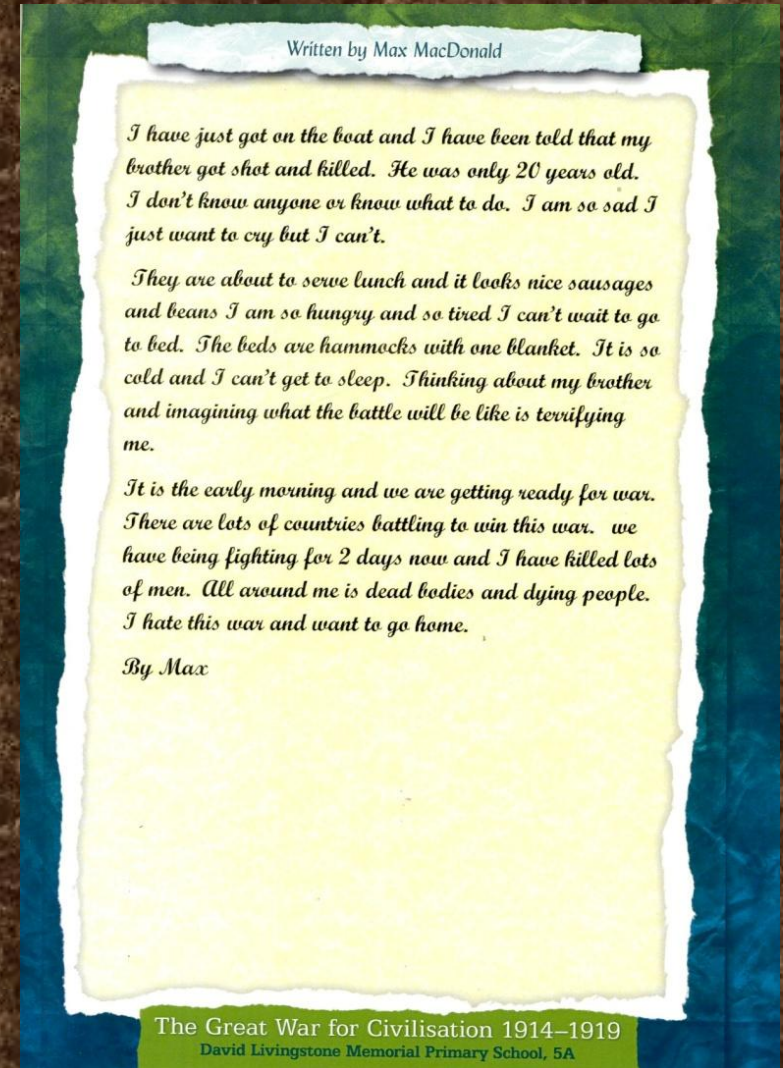

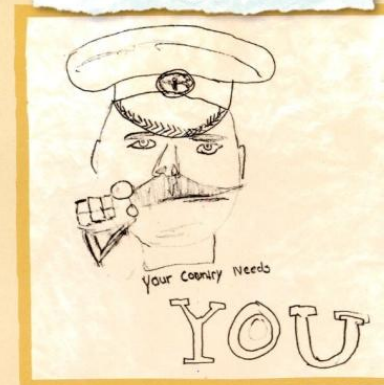

This display shows how many men from the two regiments went out to Gallipoli

Side nearest fireplace represents the number of men from these two who initially served in Gallipoli.

Side nearest windows - represents the number who were eventually evacuated off the peninsula at the end of the campaign.

468 killed in action

The Cameronians (Scottish Rifles) lost more men in a single battle, during one day, than on any other day over the entire First World War.
