

This display shows how many men from the two regiments went out to Gallipoli

Side nearest fireplace represents the number of men from these two who initially served in Gallipoli.

Side nearest windows - represents the number who were eventually evacuated off the peninsula at the end of the campaign.















28th of June 1915 - Battle of Gully Ravine -The Cameronians(Scottish Rifles) 7th and 8th Battalions 468 killed in action

The Cameronians (Scottish Rifles) lost more men in a single battle, during one day, than on any other day over the entire First World War.
